One of the Forge's creative and exciting new partnerships is with Hayes Freedom High School (HFHS) teacher Kelly Johnson. In 2013, after a career as a Supervising Production Engineer at a local manufacturing company, Kelly participated in his company's mentoring program with HFHS students and found it to be such a rewarding experience that he decided to change careers! Kelly became a Career and Technical Education (CTE) teacher and has been on the faculty at HFHS since 2017.

Kelly saw a need for "real world" guidance in preparing young people for success and independence after high school and he quickly became a fan of experience- and project-based learning. Inviting mentors and guests to his classroom became an excellent way to connect students with professionals and to introduce workplace expectations. Hayes' principal was familiar with the Forge and suggested that Kelly might want to explore a potential partnership. "After reviewing the mission, vision, and core

values of the Forge, I felt they were in alignment with Hayes Freedom and the Forge would be a perfect partner," he says. Kelly met with Forge Executive Director Matt Overton, and planning began on how to best work together for the greatest positive impact in the lives of students.

Matt and Kelly chose material from the Forge curriculum that dovetailed perfectly with Kelly's *Applied Communications* and *Personal and Career Readiness* courses. With COVID-19 restrictions requiring classes to be held via Zoom, Matt joined in twice a week and he and Kelly shared in teaching and interacting with freshmen students, "forging" new relationships. "Ninth grade is a stressful, transitionary year for many students, so forming meaningful connections in their first year of high school can initiate the longest and strongest relationships possible," explains Kelly.

Kelly said, "The students were very engaged with Matt's lessons and storytelling. We made a great team and it was a lot of fun for everyone." He continues, "I'm excited for all students to return to the classroom, so that we can have more Forge adults in our class - that's where the real connection and relationship building can happen."
