FROM FORGE STUDENT TO MOWTOWN TO BOARD MEMBER

Luis Avila remembers being a young boy and tagging along with his father on landscaping jobs. During those times of mowing straight lines in lawns, trimming bushes and spreading mulch, Eduardo Avila began instilling responsibility and dedication in his son. "He really taught me his work ethic and wanted me to have it for myself," Luis, now 18, said. That influence and a vision for his future have propelled Luis to land jobs and to become the youngest and newest member of the Columbia Future Forge Board of Directors. "Luis is phenomenal. He's one of the most mature kids I've worked with," said Matt Overton, founding director of The Forge.

A 2023 graduate of Mountain View High School, Luis started with Columbia Future Forge in the winter of 2020, learning money management, goal-setting, professionalism, and figuring out what he's good at as part of the program's life-skills training. He eventually went into an entry-level job with the Forge's Mowtown Teen Lawn Care — what he calls "mowing and blowing" the church grounds, as well as people's yards. He began with the program earlier than most teens, but Overton saw potential in Avila.

"Luis is worth investing in. That's the key to the Forge," Overton said. "We're trying to find the right kids who we can leverage an impact on ... giving them the chance to imagine and try experiences on for size, and see what's possible and in good alignment with who they are."

Today, Luis is a Mowtown crew leader, directing and supervising two or three other teens as they keep the landscaped grounds around Columbia Presbyterian Church looking nice. Also, "I've started working on bids, such as measuring, figuring how much mulch is needed, and contacting people to get it," he said. "Sometimes I fix machines. I like opening them up and seeing what I can figure out."

Last summer, after his junior year at Mountain View High School, Luis was chosen to be intern for Skanska, the multinational construction company that built the new school campus. He worked on the company's final punch list, going around the building to document what still needed to be done, contacting the subcontractors and sched-uling the work. Although Luis had thought of going into mechanical engineering for a career, the Skanska intern-

ship opened his eyes to other possibilities. "I think this experience helped me look into the trades and value that," he said. "And to be honest, I enjoy that work." He now wants to be an electrician. He has applied to the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 48 for an apprenticeship and has an aptitude test scheduled.

HE COLUMBIA FUTURE

Luis was appointed to the Future Forge Board earlier this year. Board member Julie Mauer said he's learning to find his voice with the group, whose members have years of experience in various professions and trades. "He has contributed to donor outreach and has suggested modifications to the Forge training programs," she added. Luis said he values learning about how Future Forge works. As a board member, he sees spreadsheets about costs and expenditures, and what it takes to run a business. "I think I have an interest in someday having my own company," Luis said. Overton has no doubts that Luis will reach his goals: "I think Luis is capable of doing anything he wants to do. Not only is he capable, he is motivated."
